JULY 2010

◆ **July 3, 2010**

Lāna'i Pineapple Festival – Each year in Dole Park, this event features historic and cultural displays in celebration of the island's history. Entertainment, local food, crafts and activities for children will also be available. For more information, call 808-565-0200.

◆ **July 4, 2010**

Concert in the Sky (Kaua'i) – This annual event is a fundraiser for Kaua'i Hospice, which has the largest display of aerial fireworks on the island along with hula, local music, rides, games, local products for sale, and an auction. ◆ **July 4, 2010**

◆ **July 10, 2010**

Kilauea Cultural Festival (Hawai'i's Big Island) – Learn Hawaiian crafts from the masters and make a lei or feather *kāhili*, play Hawaiian games like *pala'ie* (a loop and ball game), weave a coconut basket, and taste traditional foods. Attendees also have a chance to learn from skilled practitioners who demonstrate their arts of fishing, throwing net, building a canoe, and much more.
